

Dear Friends in Christ,

Pastor Steven E. Albertin told the following story. He said, in my church secretary's office there hangs a modernistic picture composed of a maze of colors and shapes. I realized these sophisticated, modern, and abstract pictures were supposed to contain some profound artistic or philosophical message, but I never was able to figure it out. It just looked like a jumbled mass of confusion. If there was a message there, I was blind to it.

One day while I was standing in the office, waiting for the copier to warm up, one of the congregation's kindergarten-age boys, Adam, stood beside me and said, "Do you see what I see?"

"Do you see something in that picture? I sure don't." Adam looked at me with glee in his eye, "Pastor, can't you see him? It's Jesus hanging on the cross." I stared as hard as I could, until my eyes actually hurt from staring. I wanted to believe Adam and that there actually was the image of Jesus hanging on the cross hidden somewhere in that mass of color and shapes, but I couldn't see Jesus anywhere. "Adam, I'm sorry but I must be blind. You will have to help me see."

Directing his finger to a mass of color in the center of the picture, Adam said, "There, Pastor. Do you see what I see? There is Jesus, his face, his arms outstretched on the cross." And then, like an **epiphany**, the image began to appear. Yes, there hidden somehow "behind" the colors and the shapes was the barely visible image of Jesus, hanging with arms outstretched on the cross. "It's amazing, Adam. You have helped one blind pastor to see Jesus. Yes, I can see what you see, Adam."

There is so much noise in the world today. There are so many voices and images competing for our attention. Is it any surprise that we have a hard time seeing Jesus at work in our world today?

When I went to Ohio State I loved to sit outside on the Oval and eat my lunch. On a warm spring day there would be a dozen spokesmen/preachers all trying to outshout one another. One day a lone figure sat down defiantly in the middle of the Oval and held up a sign which said, "SILENT PROTEST." Someone tapped him on the shoulder and asked, "What are you protesting?" The defiant figure held up another sign which said simply, "NOISE."

February 22nd is Ash Wednesday. It is a season of meditation and contemplation. It is a time for self-examination, to see inside ourselves and discover what needs redemption. It is a time to quiet our minds so we can see Jesus. And so I invite you to join us on Wednesday evenings in March for a evening meal and worship. The Soup supper will begin at 5:30 pm and the service will begin at 6:30 pm. Come and see Jesus!

There was plenty to eat, with many enjoying seconds. A number of quarts of soup were left over and distributed to some of our homebound members.

Our "special additional needs" tables had some surprises this month. It seems that we had some excess grocery items left over from our annual distribution of Christmas boxes. As a result, these excess items were made available along with our normal items (paper towels, Kleenex, toilet paper, feminine products, disinfectant wipes, dishwashing liquid, body wash, etc.). By the end of the night, nearly everything was gone. These items are useful and needed by many in our community. Praise God we are in a position to help!

Our Community Closet was blessed with an influx of warm hats and gloves from donations made and displayed on our giving tree in the Glitzeman Lounge. Remember folks, it is winter, and warm winter items are always in need.

We are especially grateful and happy to report the receipt of a prepaid credit card from Thrivent for \$250. In addition we are pleased to report a sizeable contribution from the Rodney Klein Stock market Museum & Library in support of our ministry. This, along with two (2) additional significant contributions from members of the congregation have been a great blessing and encouragement to us as we move forward into 2023. 



Stewardship Corner

SENDING IT ON AHEAD

Sigmund Freud's favorite story was about the sailor shipwrecked on one of the South Sea islands. He was seized by the natives, hoisted to their shoulders, carried to the village, and set on a rude throne. Little by little, he learned that it was their custom once each year to make some man a king, king for a year. He liked it until he began to wonder what happened to all the former kings. Soon he discovered that every year when his kingship was ended, the king was banished to an island, where he starved to death. The sailor did not like that, but he was smart and he was king, king for a year. So he put his carpenters to work making boats, his farmers to work transplanting fruit trees to the island, farmers growing crops, masons building houses. So when his kingship was over, he was banished, not to a barren island, but to an island of abundance. It is a good parable of life: We're all kings here, kings for a little while, able to choose what we shall do with the stuff of life.

"Lay not up for yourselves treasures upon earth, where moth and rust doth corrupt, and where thieves break through and steal. But lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust doth corrupt, and where thieves do not break through nor steal" (Matt. 6:19-20).
