



Dear Friends in Christ,

Trevor Beeson stood at the high altar of Westminster Abbey to celebrate the marriage of his daughter, Catharine, to Anthony, aged twenty-three. Nine months later he stood before the same altar for Anthony's funeral, who was killed when his car ran into a wall in East London. Four months later, Trevor returned to the altar beside the coffin of his friend and hero Earl Mountbatten, who died when his fishing boat was blown to pieces by Irish terrorist. Reflecting on the experience, he said he could not blame God for these senseless tragedies. He wrote:

I should find it impossible to believe in, and worship, a God who arranged for the great servants of the community to be blown up on their holidays and who deliberately turned a young man's car into a brick wall. . .. This is not the God of love whose ways are revealed in the Bible and supremely in the life of Jesus Christ.

Beeson found two insights that helped him to cope with his tragedy and to look beyond it:
"The first is that, although God is not responsible for causing tragedy, he is not a detached observer of our suffering. On the contrary, he is immersed in it with us, sharing to the full our particular grief and pain. This is the fundamental significance of the cross."

Second, although we naturally ask, "Why did it happen?" Beeson discovered that the more important question is "What are we going to make of it?"; "Every tragedy contains within it the seeds of resurrection." This is, after all, the whole point of our pilgrimage through Lent, to Good Friday, and Easter morning. (John Berglsn, Sermon.com)

These two insights are particularly important to me as we enter this season of Lent. We see both the humanity of Christ and the divinity of Christ. We see Christ's humanity in the grief he feels at the death of his friend Lazarus, the anger he feels toward the money changers in the temple, the compassion he has for those in need of healing, and the fear he feels the night before his trial and death on the cross.

We also see Christ's divinity. We see it when Christ's sets his face toward Jerusalem knowing what awaited him there. We see it in the compassion he has for the sick. We see it, even though he feared the pain of the cross, when he prayed to his Father that his will be done. We experience it when Christ spoke a word of forgiveness while he hung on the cross dying. And finally, we experience it as we are made whole in the blood of the Lamb.

I hope during this season of Lent you will experience both Christ's humanity and his divinity. Blessings,

Stewardship Corner

SENDING IT ON AHEAD

Sigmund Freud's favorite story was about the sailor shipwrecked on one of the South Sea islands. He was seized by the natives, hoisted to their shoulders, carried to the village, and set on a rude throne. Little by little, he learned that it was their custom once each year to make some man a king, king for a year. He liked it until he began to wonder what happened to all the former kings. Soon he discovered that every year when his kingship was ended, the king was banished to an island, where he starved to death. The sailor did not like that, but he was smart and he was king, king for a year. So he put his carpenters to work making boats, his farmers to work transplanting fruit trees to the island, farmers growing crops, masons building houses. So when his kingship was over, he was banished, not to a barren island, but to an island of abundance. It is a good parable of life: We're all kings here, kings for a little while, able to choose what we shall do with the stuff of life.

"Lay not up for yourselves treasures upon earth, where moth and rust doth corrupt, and where thieves break through and steal. But lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust doth corrupt, and where thieves do not break through nor steal" (Matt. 6:19-20).

Because of generous donors like you, many hurting children, including thousands of Ukrainian displaced and refugee children, are finding hope and joy through our Gift of Hope children's Christmas outreach program that is now in full swing in Poland, Moldova, Ukraine, and across Eurasia.

These include Viktoria, age 5, who came with her mother and brother to our I Care refugee assistance center in Moldova after fleeing from the war in Mykolaiv, Ukraine. As Viktoria explained: "My dad use to read me fairy tales before bedtime, but we had to leave all of those books at home because of the war. My mom gets really sad sometimes, so I want these Bible stories to help her, too!"

Once again, thank you for your prayers and support that are bringing the true hope of the gospel to those in Eurasia– like Viktoria and her family-who need it the most.


Adult Sunday School Dying and Rising: A Journey through Lent to Easter
