Dear Friends in Christ,

In the Gospel of Matthew, Jesus often taught in parables. He used everyday examples to convey profound spiritual truths about the Kingdom of God. In Chapter 13, Jesus shares a series of parables to illustrate the nature and significance of His kingdom.

The first parable speaks of a tiny mustard seed that grows into a large tree, providing shelter for the birds of the air. Jesus compares the mustard seed to the Kingdom of God, emphasizing how something small and seemingly insignificant can grow into something great. It teaches us that God's kingdom may start humbly, but its impact and influence can be extraordinary.

The second parable likens the Kingdom of God to yeast that a woman mixes into a large amount of dough. As the yeast permeates the dough, it causes it to rise and become leavened. This image reveals the transformative power of God's kingdom in our lives. It reminds us that God desires to penetrate every area of our existence and bring about profound change, influencing our thoughts, actions, and character.

Jesus then presents two short parables that emphasize the priceless value of the Kingdom of God. In the first, a person discovers a hidden treasure buried in a field. Overwhelmed by the treasure's worth, the person joyfully sells everything to acquire it. The second parable describes a merchant in search of fine pearls who finds one of great value and sells all he has to obtain it. Both parables teach us that the Kingdom of God is worth more than anything else in this world. It is a treasure of immeasurable worth, surpassing all temporal possessions and desires.

In the final parable, Jesus speaks of a net thrown into the sea, gathering fish of every kind. After the net is filled, the fishermen separate the good fish from the bad. This parable illustrates the ultimate judgment that awaits us all. The Kingdom of God will encompass people from all walks of life, but only those who truly belong to God will inherit eternal life. It reminds us to be discerning and strive to live according to God's will, distinguishing between what is righteous and what is not.

These parables highlight different aspects of the Kingdom of God, emphasizing its growth, transformative power, immeasurable value, and ultimate judgment. They invite us to contemplate the depth of God's love and His desire for a personal relationship with us. They challenge us to seek and embrace the Kingdom of God wholeheartedly, recognizing its surpassing worth and surrendering everything to be a part of it.

As we meditate on these parables, may we be inspired to live in anticipation of the Kingdom of God, allowing its transformative power to take root in our lives. May we cherish the priceless treasure of God's kingdom, giving up worldly attachments and pursuing a life that aligns with God's will. And may we strive to discern what is good and righteous, standing firm in our faith, knowing that the ultimate judgment belongs to God alone.

St. Paul's still relies on endowment funds to meet our current budget. One of the ways we hope to minimize our reliance on these funds is through a special offering on the 5th Sunday of the month.

In the fiscal year, there are three months with 5 Sundays of the month to reduce the deficit. Our Challenge is that each family prayerfully consider making an extra week of offering for this fiscal year.

If you cannot make a full extra week of offering? Perhaps, you can spread it out over a few weeks, or even just a few dollars can make a difference. Every dollar adds up and with each donation we can greatly reduce or eliminate our reliance on endowment funds!

Stewardship: Water Conservation

Water is a precious resource gifted to us by God. It sustains life, refreshes our bodies, and plays a vital role in the flourishing of creation. Yet, in our fast-paced and consumption-driven world, water conservation often takes a backseat. As stewards of God's creation, it is crucial for us to recognize the importance of conserving water and nurturing the environment God has entrusted to our care.

In the opening chapters of Genesis, we read about the magnificent act of creation. God spoke, and the Earth came to be. Among the wonders of creation, God separated the waters from the dry land, forming seas, rivers, and lakes. Water holds a special place in God's creation, and its beauty and life-giving properties remind us of His providence.

Here are some practical ways that the average person can conserve water in their daily lives:

- 1. Be Mindful of Water Usage: One of the simplest ways to conserve water is to be conscious of how we use it. Avoid leaving taps running unnecessarily and make a habit of turning off the faucet while brushing teeth, washing dishes, or lathering soap. Every drop saved counts.
- 2. Fix Leaks and Dripping Faucets: Leaks can waste a significant amount of water over time. Regularly check your plumbing fixtures for leaks and repair them promptly. A small drip may seem insignificant, but it can add up to a significant amount of wasted water.
- 3. Shorten Shower Time: Showers can consume a large amount of water. Consider reducing your shower time by a few minutes to conserve water. Installing a low-flow showerhead can also significantly reduce water usage without compromising the quality of your shower experience.
- 4. Water Plants Efficiently: When watering plants, be mindful of the amount of water used. Water plants during cooler hours to minimize evaporation, and target the roots directly to avoid unnecessary runoff. Consider using drip irrigation systems or soaker hoses, which deliver water directly to the plants' root zones.

Choose Native and Drought-Tolerant Plants: Landscaping can be a significant source of water consumption. Choose for native plants or those that are well-adapted to your region's climate and require less water to thrive. These plants are often more drought-tolerant and can reduce the need for excessive watering.

Remember, every small effort to conserve water adds up and makes a difference. By being mindful of our water usage and implementing these practices, we can play an active role in preserving this precious resource and honoring God's creation.


