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Pastoral message: the journey to Easter



Dear friends in Christ,

As we enter into this sacred season of reflection and anticipation, may we recognize the profound truth that the journey to Easter requires us to experience the death of the Cross if we are to truly embrace the joy of resurrection.

In Romans 6:3-11, we are reminded that through baptism, we have been buried with Christ in His death so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead through the glory of the Father, we too may live a new life. Help us to grasp the significance of this union with Christ's death. In laying down our old selves, we participate in the redemptive process, paving the way for the new life promised in the Resurrection.

In John 12:24-26, Jesus teaches us about the paradox of life emerging from death. "Truly, truly, I say to you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains alone; but if it dies, it bears much fruit." As we contemplate the seed that must die to bring forth new life, let us recognize the necessity of surrendering our lives to the transformative power of the Cross. Only through death can we experience the abundant and fruitful life that Easter promises.

Colossians 2:12 speaks of being buried with Christ in baptism and raised with Him through faith in the power of God. Help us, Lord, to internalize the truth that the Cross is not just a historical event but a personal and ongoing experience. As we identify with Christ's death, may we also share in the glory of His resurrection.

As we approach Holy Week at the end of this month, as we journey towards the Cross, grant us the courage to confront our own brokenness, sin, and the areas of our lives that need to be crucified. In the shadow of the Cross, may we find not only a place of surrender but also a source of hope and transformation.

As we approach the joyous celebration of Easter, let the reality of Christ's victory over death resonate deeply within us. May the resurrection joy be magnified in our hearts because we have walked the path of the Cross, experiencing the death that gives way to life.

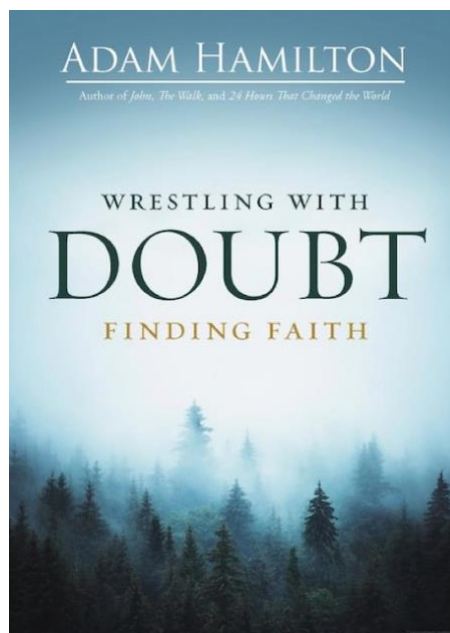
Please join as we meet each Sunday for Bible study and fellowship at 11:30, top floor of Parish Hall. An elevator is available for easy access.

Church Council highlights

Report from Dr. Patty Long, Church Council President

Impact Massillon

Church Council met on February 13. In his report, Pastor Mark shared that our church will likely be involved in Impact Massillon in 2024, which is an opportunity to help a specific neighborhood of Massillon residents with outdoor home repair and yard improvements. The date for the event is **Saturday, June 1**. More information will be provided in the coming months. The annual event is organized by the Massillon Area Clergy Association, in which Pastor Mark is very active.

Capital Campaign: bequest from Ann Hopkins

The Capital Campaign has a balance of \$158,929.69 as of this reporting. Renovations continue on the Gleitsman Lounge with the goal of most improvements completed by Easter Sunday. The estate of Ann Hopkins donated \$29,000 which will go to the Capital Campaign and the lounge project. Ann's family is delighted this contribution will be put to good use targeting the lounge.

Ann Hopkins died on November 27, 2023, at the age of 98. She was a graduate of Capital University and a very active member of St. Paul's as Director of Education and church secretary. She relocated to the Columbus area about 25 years ago to be closer to her adult children. We give thanks to the Lord that Ann remembered her St. Paul's family and praise God for her faithfulness.

Mission Endowment Fund: matching funds, Amber Acres, new form

The Mission Endowment Fund approved two requests for funding. The Church Youth and Parish Education Committee asked that the fund match up to \$2000 for donations received toward the "Forty Days of Giving" Lenten appeal, targeting ELCA Hunger Programs.

The second request came from Henry Haake on behalf of [Forever Amber Acres](#) in Medina, Ohio. "The mission of Forever Amber Acres is to provide safe, purposeful rehabilitation, and retirement aftercare for special needs horses and other animals to serve military veterans,

children, families, and seniors dealing with physical and emotional challenges.” The Mission Endowment Fund will donate \$1500 to this good work. It’s notable that one of our St. Paul’s youth submitted the application and is active, along with his dad, in the program at Amber Acres. Thank you, Henry!

Property Management Committee: phone system, room usage, church boiler

The Property Management Committee brought two requests to Council. One was to explore options for improving our church phone system for greater efficiency, effectiveness, and confidentiality. The motion was approved.

The second request was to consider the possibility of allowing the Massillon Amateur Club to utilize space in the St. Paul's Education Building. Council encouraged the committee to further explore options with the Club.

Property Management also wanted to alert Church Council to fairly serious issues regarding the church boiler. Although there continues to be good service provided to keep the boiler operational through this winter, there may be a need to replace it before the winter of 2024-2025. The system is more than 30 years old and is definitely showing signs of wear, which may require substantial repair or complete replacement. We are grateful for the work of Jim Johnson and others on the committee who keep a close eye on these critical systems of operation in our church buildings.

Change in newsletter format

Beginning with this March issue of *The Bridge*, Carol Butler will assume the responsibilities as editor. *The Bridge* will be shared in a new electronic newsletter format and will be more accessible and effective in disseminating information within and beyond the St. Paul's Church community. We are grateful to Carol for her willingness take on these additional responsibilities. Anderson (Andy) Rambler is a 16-year-old music scholar, who is dedicated to and passionate about learning, studying, and pursuing music not only currently, but also in college and professionally. Andy is a bass-baritone and studies classical voice with Denise Milner Howell, adjunct Professor of Voice at the Cleveland Institute of Music.

He is a junior in high school, attending the Akron School for the Arts at Firestone CLC, where he sings in 4 choirs, including the Madrigals Chorus, Bass Choir, Vocal Jazz Ensemble, and Symphonic Choir, where he serves as bass section leader, all under the direction of Mrs. Megan Meyer. At Firestone, Andy is an auditioned student in the theatre program, where he has performed supporting and leading roles in 10 productions, plays, and musicals.

Recent accolades Andy has been honored to receive include a Superior (I) rating in the class A category at OMEA Solo and Ensemble, a finalist at the Schmidt Classical Voice regional competition in Fall 2023, placing 3rd in the High School classical voice category in the Ohio NATS competition in Fall 2023, in which he was the highest placing male singer.

Finally, he is premiering a piece written for him by Cleveland composer Margi Griebeling-Haigh in May with the Cleveland Composers Guild. Andy is incredibly honored to be singing at St. Paul's Lutheran church, and we at St. Paul's are so lucky he is sharing his gifts with us!

America. When offered a scholarship at the renowned Juilliard School of Music in New York, he moved to the United States. Three years later, Mr. Olivera's outstanding professional concert career was launched when he won the AGO's National Improvisation Contest.

Whether in a prestigious venue like Carnegie Hall, Royal Albert Hall, Cathedral of Notre Dame in Paris, Constitution Hall, or Walt Disney Concert Hall in Los Angeles, the most sophisticated and demanding organ aficionados claim that Maestro Hector Olivera is 'one of the finest organists in the world today.'" 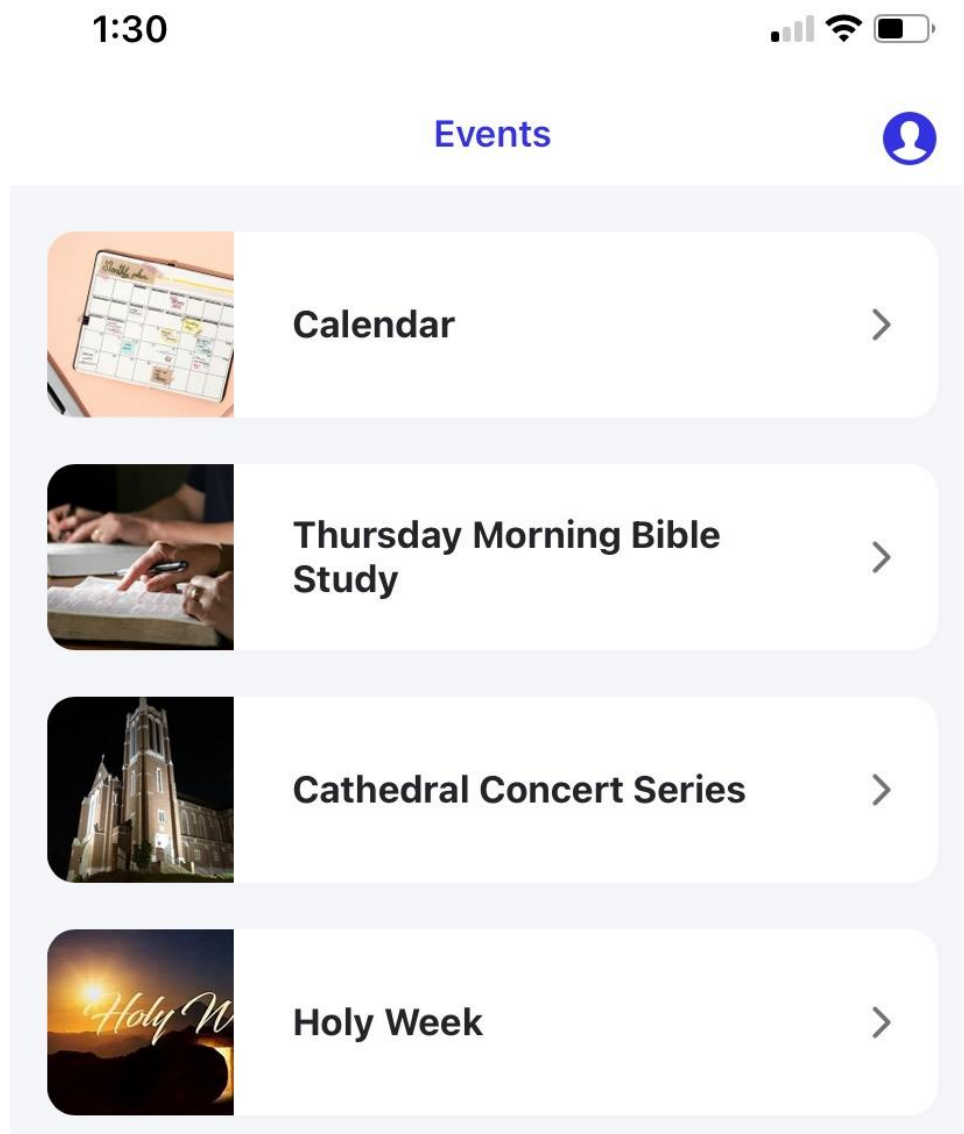
Choose My Church by Pushpay from the App Store.
