

Today's Worship Theme

On Ash Wednesday the church began its journey toward baptismal immersion in the death and resurrection of Christ. This year, the Sundays in Lent lead us to focus on five covenants God makes in the Hebrew Scriptures and to use them as lenses through which to view baptism. First Peter connects the way God saved Noah's family in the flood with the way God saves us through the water of baptism. The baptismal covenant is made with us individually, but the new life we are given in baptism is for the sake of the whole world.

NICENE CREED

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

The peace of Christ be with you always. And also with you.




OFFERING PRAYER


All praise and glory are yours, Holy One of Israel, Word of God incarnate, Power of the Most High, one God, now and forever. **Amen.**

Music Notes

In honor of Black History Month, our service music will feature texts and compositions by Black composers.

A Virginia native, Dr. Marques L. A. Garrett is Associate Professor of Choral Studies at the University of North Texas. He holds a PhD in Music Education (Choral Conducting) from Florida State University, an MM from the University of North Carolina at Greensboro, and a BA from Hampton University. An active conductor, Dr. Garrett is the founding conductor of the Nebraska Festival Singers and previously served as artistic director of the Omaha Symphonic Chorus. A versatile voice that performs both as a baritone and countertenor, Dr. Garrett has sung with several community, church, and university groups as both a chorister and soloist (including with Tom Trenney and the choir of First-Plymouth, who visited us last fall!). Dr. Garrett is an avid composer of choral and solovocal music, and today's prelude is a transcription of his choral anthem.

Today's anthem uses the text of the African-American poet Paul Laurence Dunbar (1872-1906). Paul Laurence Dunbar was born in Dayton, Ohio, to two formerly enslaved people from Kentucky and became one of the first influential Black poets in American literature. He was internationally acclaimed for his dialect verse in collections such as *Majors and Minors* (Hadley & Hadley, 1895) and *Lyrics of Lowly Life* (Dodd, Mead and Company, 1896). The dialect poems constitute only a small portion of Dunbar's canon, which is replete with novels, short stories, essays, and many poems. In its entirety, Dunbar's literary body is regarded as an impressive representation of Black life in the turn-of-the-century United States, and his texts has been used in more than 200 musical settings.

"Lead gently, Lord, and slow, For oh, my steps are weak, And ever as I go, Some soothing sentence speak; That I may turn my face Through doubt's obscurity toward thine abiding-place, E'en tho' I cannot see. For lo, the way is dark; Through mist and cloud I grope, Save for that fitful spark, The little flame of hope. Lead gently, Lord, and slow, For fear that I may fall; I know not where to go Unless I hear thy call. My fainting soul doth yearn For thy green hills afar; So let thy mercy burn--My greater, guiding star!"

Dr. Norah Duncan IV is a professor, and former Chair of the Department of Music, at Wayne State University. Duncan received an undergraduate degree from the University of Detroit, a Master of Music degree from Wayne State University, and a Doctor of Musical Arts degree from the University of Michigan. He has performed extensively in both the United States, Europe, and Australia and served as music director for the Cathedral of the Most Blessed Sacrament (Detroit) from 1980 to 2007. He was director of music for the historic visit of Pope John Paul II to Detroit in 1987. Because of his interest in Gregorian Chant, with the Benedictine Monastery in Solesmes, France, he established the Gregorian Institute of Detroit for the study of chant music. Dr. Duncan was a member of both the editorial and advisory committees for the revision of *Lead Me, Guide Me*, the African American Catholic Hymnal.

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

Connections with Creation

Water. Wilderness. Good news. That's the narrative flow of both Jesus' calling into ministry and Noah's deliverance from the flood. After an experience with water, each character enters a wilderness (one of desert, another of ocean) for forty days, then emerges into a gospel future. For Noah, it's the rainbow, the covenantal sign with all creation that God intends life, not death. For Jesus, it's the annunciation of heaven's reign come near. Waters can bring both birth and death. The wilderness can be both gorgeous and vicious. Yet through encounters with both, God brings new life and new promise. Consider the waters and wildernesses of your community and investigate how God might be bringing good news to all through those who journey through them.


