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### The Significance of Holy Week



"And being found in appearance as a man, he humbled himself by becoming obedient to death—even death on a cross!" **Philippians 2:8** 

#### Dear Friends in Christ,

Holy Week is the most sacred time in the Christian calendar, marking the final days of Jesus' earthly ministry. It is a journey through suffering, sacrifice, and ultimately, the triumph of Christ over sin and death. Each day carries profound significance, inviting us to reflect on God's immense love and the price of our redemption.

### Palm Sunday: The Triumphal Entry

Jesus enters Jerusalem as the prophesied King, greeted with shouts of "Hosanna!" (Matthew 21:9). Yet, this moment of celebration foreshadows His coming suffering. It reminds us that Jesus' kingship is not about earthly power but sacrificial love.

This Sunday is often referred to as Passion Sunday. In the Roman Rite, the Gospel reading at the Mass of the sixth Sunday in Lent is an account in one of the Synoptic Gospels of the Passion of Christ. Until 1969, the lesson was always the account from the Gospel of Matthew: the whole of chapters 26 and 27. Since 1970, the revised Roman Missal has been using a three-year cycle in which the accounts of Matthew (26:14–27:66 or 27:11–54), Mark (14:1–15:47 or 15:1–39) and Luke (22:14–23:56 or 23:1–49) are alternated in successive years.[12]

### Maundy Thursday: The Last Supper

Jesus shares His final meal with His disciples, instituting the Lord's Supper and demonstrating servant-hearted love by washing their feet (John 13:1-17). This day calls us to remember His sacrifice and live in humble service to one another.

### **Good Friday: The Crucifixion**

Jesus willingly lays down His life on the cross, bearing the weight of humanity's sin (John 19:30). This day is one of sorrow and gratitude, as we meditate on the depth of Christ's suffering for our salvation.

### **Resurrection Sunday: The Victory of Christ**

On Easter morning, the tomb is empty! Christ has conquered death, securing eternal life for all who believe (Matthew 28:6). This is the foundation of our faith—hope is alive because Jesus lives!

### **Reflection and Prayer:**

As we walk through Holy Week, let us open our hearts to the love of Christ. May we remember His sacrifice, embrace His grace, and live in the power of His resurrection.

Take time each day to reflect on what Jesus endured for our sake. Are we truly living in response to His sacrifice? Are we surrendering our hearts to Him in faith and obedience? Holy Week is not only about remembrance but about transformation. Let this week be an opportunity to renew our commitment to Christ, deepen our understanding of His love, and share His message of redemption with others.

May we move forward with hearts full of gratitude, walking in the victory of Christ's resurrection, and proclaiming His name in our words and actions.

### St. Paul's Lent and Easter Services

Sunday, April 13, 10:00: Palm Sunday Church Service

Today we follow Christ from triumphal entry to the cross, each waypoint of the journey marked by Jesus' compassion for those who would betray, mock, accuse, or do violence to him. Though persecuted and beaten, Jesus the Son of God is not disgraced; instead, he asks forgiveness for those who put him to death. We have walked the Lenten pathway these forty days, each of us invited through baptism to "let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus." We enter this holy week accompanying Jesus to the cross with both grief and thanksgiving in our hearts, trusting in God's redeeming love.

#### Thursday, April 17, 7 pm: Maundy Thursday Worship

This evening our Lenten observance comes to an end, and we gather with Christians around the world to celebrate the Three Days of Jesus' death and resurrection. Tonight we remember Christ's last meal with his disciples, but the central focus is his commandment that we live out the promise embodied in this meal. As Jesus washed his disciples' feet, so we are called to give and receive love in humble service to one another. Formed into a new body in Christ through this holy meal, we are transformed by the mercy we have received and carry it into the world. Departing worship in solemn silence, we anticipate the coming days.

### Friday, April 18, 7 pm: Good Friday Worship Service

Life and death stand side by side as we enter into Good Friday. In John's passion account, Jesus reveals the power and glory of God, even as he is put on trial and sentenced to death. Standing with the disciples at the foot of the cross, we pray for the whole world in the ancient bidding prayer, as Christ's death offers life to all. We gather in solemn devotion, but always with the promise that the tree around which we assemble is indeed a tree of life. We depart silently, and we anticipate the culmination of the Three Days in the Easter Vigil.

"The last enemy to be destroyed is death," Paul writes. Today Christ is risen, and we gather together with astonishment and joy. Christ is risen, and we have been set free from the bonds of death. Christ is risen, and we are forgiven. Christ is risen, and with the women at the tomb and Peter, we are amazed. Let us rejoice: Christ is risen indeed! Alleluia!


### God's Redemptive Grace in Jesus

### **Church Council Highlights**

Report from Tuesday, March 11, 2025

### Pastor's Report: Impact Massillon

In Pastor's report, he shared that Impact Massillon is meeting soon to make final arrangements for the work that will be accomplished in June for a selected neighborhood in Massillon. St. Paul's had good representation last year among the churches that sent volunteers to provide much needed outdoor repair and refurbishment to homes as a gesture of love and service to our neighbors. Pastor Mark is hoping there is again a number of people from our church to share in this good work. Pastor also mentioned in his report that the NEOS Assembly will be a one-day, virtual event on May 17. LaShell and Lynn Williamson are the delegates from St. Paul's.

### **Treasurer's Report**

Dan Farrar, church treasurer, shared the budget report and noted that our expenditures did exceed income for the month of February. He attributed this result to costs related to snow removal and higher than usual electric and heating bills. It was a much more wintery January and February this year! Thankfully our church boiler, which is about to be replaced with a more efficient and reliable system, remained in service allowing for comfortable temperatures in the building. Dan also mentioned that the Finance Committee will be meeting on Tuesday, March 18, to prepare the 2025-2026 budget recommendations for Council's consideration at its April meeting.

### Worship and Church Music Committee

Greg Klein reported for the Worship and Church Music Committee. Dr. Abby Haake is working on our St. Paul's Cathedral Concert Series for the 2025-2026 season and has tentative commitments from several artists and groups. The schedule will be finalized in the coming months. It should be another wonderful slate of concerts.

### Property Management Committee

The report from the Property Management Committee was given by Dennis Morgan. An item needing action from Church Council related to the annual "Mechanical Investment Service Proposal" from Standard Plumbing & Heating Company. The goal of the service contract is for Standard to "keep facility environments – building and the equipment they contain – in good health." As such, the "proposal is designed to match your [St. Paul's] specific needs with our [Standard's] capabilities and provide you with reduced overall costs, improved equipment efficiency, better comfort, extended equipment life and general peace of mind related to HVAC [and plumbing] systems." The total annual cost of the contract is \$3,767.64 or \$313.97 per month. This is a slight increase over last year. The contract was approved by Council. Dennis also reported that repairs are continuing, with warmer temperatures, on both the church building flat roofing replacement and the stone and mortar work.

### Capital Campaign

The Capital Campaign update was given by Pastor Mark. We are grateful that funds continue to be donated to the Campaign, above and beyond regular giving, with the total raised to date at \$351,317. There have been two pre-bid meetings hosted by our hired architect, John Picard, with a third scheduled, targeting the accessible bathrooms and entryway enclosure projects. It is hoped that all bids will be received and a contractor and final bid selected by the end of March or the first week of April.

# Anneliese Daniels, a Vital Member of Our Congregation



Her favorite hobby is making baby blankets. She has made 610 blankets and given them away to Pregnancy Parenting.

Anneliese was born April 7, 1935, in the town of Speyer, Germany. When she was about 4 or 5, she moved to the very small village of Oberhausen, Germany. There her family lived with her grandmother, a common custom.

She has memories of her life during WWII: "When I was about 5 or 6, we went to a parade on "Main" Street. I remember waving a flag and cheering for a man riding in a tank. I remember thinking why does he have a dirty face? I found out it was a mustache. The man the whole town was cheering for was Hitler.

"I also remember on Sundays all the men would get together in the street to talk. However, at 7 pm everyone had to be in their homes. It was being on house arrest. If you came out of the house and a guard saw, you would be shot!

"Food was limited but we had a garden so we were not hungry.

"I also remember no one locked their doors. If the air raid sirens went off, people had to get to the bomb shelters. One of the shelters was in our home. One night when the sirens sounded they were bombing our Main Street. The corner home got bombed and everyone was killed."

She came to America in 1954 at age 19. "My mom's sister invited me. I came on the boat named Gripsholm. It took 11 days. I remember being so seasick." She became a U.S. citizen on June 9, 1961: "I love being an American Citizen. I am proud of that."

Anneliese did find work quickly: "My uncle was able to get me a job at Superior Meats after he told the boss I could speak English, which I could not. I worked in the sausage and hot dog room. I remember the girls I worked with would instruct me to do my task wrong. There was a gentleman by the name of Harry, he saw what was happening and helped me. Later when I could speak English, I made sure I told the girls how mean they were and should never do that to anyone else." In Germany she had been a licensed dress maker. After she married, she did sewing and alterations.

She married Larry Daniels and had two children: son Tim and daughter Sonia. Anneliese has three grandchildren and one great grandson.

Anneliese ended up at St. Paul's through her daughter: "I was raised Catholic in Germany, even though my father was a Lutheran. When I came to America I went to St. Mary's. My daughter Sonia was church shopping, so I decided to also shop around. I visited St. Paul's, and the service was so similar. One thing I really liked at St. Paul's was that people were actually happy and friendly. All were so welcoming."

Anneliese will turn 90 on April 7. Her daughter and son-in-law Sonia and Dave Scheetz, will have an open house for her:

Nancy Jackson, one of our Wednesday morning quilters, has provided some interesting facts about their quilting projects:

Snip-n-Stitch, St. Paul's quilting group, takes your donations of leftover materials like fabrics and sheets. We cut them up for top squares and bottoms. If you find a great price at a garage sale or thrift store, pick it up and donate to us. We welcome anyone who would like to volunteer their time and skills. There are other tasks besides sewing! But if you want to learn how to sew, we can teach you. We meet every Wednesday from 9:00 to 11:30 am, September through May.

- Lutheran World Relief was started in 1945 to help European families after WWII. One in 5 people were homeless. This year is the 80th Anniversary!
- March 15th is National Quilter's Day.
- LWR, Headquartered in Baltimore, MD, is 2 miles from the Port of Baltimore. They provided support to seafarers stuck in the port after the collapse of the Francis Scott Key Bridge by distributing quilts and personal care kits to make their stay more comfortable as they were unable to disembark due to the bridge damage.
- Hurricanes Helene and Milton devastated our neighbors in North Carolina and throughout the southeastern US. Thanks to our incredible donors, help was on the way before the hurricanes even reached land. Quilts and kits were distributed to Florida, Louisiana, Tennessee, Mississippi, and North Carolina and they are still helping those areas.
- LWR asks for donations to help with shipping the quilts and kits. The cost to ship 1 quilt overseas is \$2.80 LWR encourages people to contribute to the Quilt & Kit Shipping Fund to ensure their donated items can be delivered efficiently overseas. \$28 sends 10 quilts.
