

[Paul writes:] ^{4b} If anyone else has reason to be confident in the flesh, I have more: ⁵ circumcised on the eighth day, a member of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew born of Hebrews; as to the law, a Pharisee; ⁶ as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to righteousness under the law, blameless.

⁷Yet whatever gains I had, these I have come to regard as loss because of Christ. ⁸More than that, I regard everything as loss because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things, and I regard them as rubbish, in order that I may gain Christ ⁹ and be found in him, not having a righteousness of my own that comes from the law, but one that comes through faith in Christ, the righteousness from God based on faith. ¹⁰ I want to know Christ and the power of his resurrection and the sharing of his sufferings by becoming like him in his death, ¹¹ if somehow I may attain the resurrection from the dead.


¹² Not that I have already obtained this or have already reached the goal; but I press on to make it my own, because Christ Jesus has made me his own. ¹³ Beloved,

receive our prayer.



Theological Reflection

Mary's anointing of Jesus' feet foreshadows the foot-washing that Jesus institutes at the last supper and which we remember on Maundy Thursday, both acts of profound love and devotion. There is incredible intimacy in this scene, with Mary using her hair to wipe Jesus' feet, a scandalous thing to do in such a public setting. But Mary's beautiful gift challenges our discomfort with intimacy and bodies and invites us to consider how our bodies engage and experience our faith. The fragrance of pure nard fills the room and the noses of every guest. Mary's hands gently rub perfume into the well-worn feet of our friend and savior. And her hair tenderly brushes the excess away. How might this scene encourage us to experience the presence of God in our own bodies, to explore what intimacy with Jesus looks like in our own lives?


