Following the Light—Learning the Way of the Cross



Dear Friends in Christ,

February often feels like a month in between. Winter still has its grip on us, the days are slowly growing longer, and in the life of the church we find ourselves standing at a crossroads. We are finishing the season of Epiphany—a season of light, revelation, and discovery—even as we begin to turn our hearts toward Lent.

Epiphany begins with a star. Wise ones from the East follow a light they do not fully understand, trusting that it will lead them to something—Someone—worth seeking. Throughout Epiphany we watch that light grow brighter as Jesus is revealed: in his baptism, in his teaching, in his healing, in the simple but powerful words, “Follow me.”

But Epiphany never lets us stop with admiration alone. The light that reveals who Jesus is also begins to show us where he is going. By the end of the season, the road becomes clearer—and harder. The one who shines with God’s glory sets his face toward Jerusalem. The light that drew the Magi forward now leads toward a cross.

That is why the movement from Epiphany into Lent is so important. Lent is not a break from the story; it is the next faithful step in following it. The question quietly shifts from “*Who is this Jesus?*” to “*Will we follow him?*”

Lent invites us to walk more intentionally, more honestly, more humbly with Christ. Through prayer, self-examination, and repentance, we are given space to notice the ways we resist the path of love and self-giving—and the ways God’s grace keeps meeting us anyway. Lent is not about proving our devotion or earning God’s favor. It is about clearing away what distracts us so we can see the light more clearly and walk in it more faithfully.

As we move through February, my prayer is that we do not rush past this in-between time. Let the light of Epiphany continue to guide you, even as it leads you into deeper places. Trust that the same Christ who calls us to take up the cross is also the one who promises resurrection. The journey may be sobering, but it is never without hope.

The light still shines—and it leads us, always, toward life.


Adult Sunday School Class

Why Did Jesus Have to Die?:

The Meaning of the Crucifixion

When words fall short, the cross still speaks.

Despite the crucifixion's central place in Christian faith, the New Testament offers few clear answers about how Jesus' death saves, or why, exactly, he had to die. The New Testament writers use a host of metaphors—ransom, sacrifice, reconciliation, victory—but never explain exactly how it works or why it had to happen this way.

What if that's because we've been asking the wrong question? What if the cross isn't a transaction to be explained, but a living Word from God meant to transform who we are and how we live?

Ash Wednesday

On Ash Wednesday we begin our forty-day journey toward Easter with a day of fasting and repentance. Marking our foreheads with dust, we acknowledge that we die and return to the earth. At the same time, the dust traces the life-giving cross indelibly marked on our foreheads at baptism. While we journey through Lent to return to God, we have already been reconciled to God through Christ. We humbly pray for God to make our hearts clean while we rejoice that “now is the day of salvation.” Returning to our baptismal call, we more intentionally bear the fruits of mercy and justice in the world.



Church Council Highlights

Report from January 13

- During Lent, we will host a combined Ash Wednesday and Good Friday service for the area Lutheran churches. We will also be hosting the first soup and sandwich service on February 25.
 - A Women's Retreat will be held at the church on March 7th.
 - Council approved the recommendation from Property Management Committee that we hire TWi for our church janitorial services. They will bring a supervised crew two days a week. Council felt that the offered price and contract were in good order and covered the services needed.
 - Needed maintenance and upgrading for the organ was discussed. We need to be considering this in the very near future as our organ is a great investment that we want to keep in good working order. More details will follow as we learn details from the company that does our tuning and maintenance.
 - The floor in the Fellowship Hall is badly in need of stripping and waxing. We will be asking, possibly, for volunteers to help with this job.
 - Council approved recommendations from Mission Endowment Committee to fully fund Pastor's sabbatical trip to Africa in the spring and to begin funding for Pastor Williamson to help with visiting those who are unable to regularly worship with us in person.
 - Conversation was begun on when to uncover and open the time capsule buried at the side of the Parish Hall.

The Boston Phoenix praised baritone Emery Stephens for singing "with ringing suavity and articulate intelligence." His performances include collaborations with the Boston Art Song Society, Bridge Chamber Music Festival, Handel & Haydn Society, Abridged Opera of Ontario, Wilmington Symphony, Arbor Opera Theater, Michigan Philharmonic, Ann Arbor Symphony, Boston Lyric Opera, Opera New England, and the Detroit Jazz Festival. Notably, he

participated in a revival of Dave Brubeck's *The Gates of Justice*, sponsored by the Detroit Jazz Festival, alongside jazz pianist Jason Moran and his trio, The Bandwagon.

His research on Black composers' works and their place in the classical canon for voice teachers and students appears in the *Journal of Singing*, *Music Teachers National Association Journal*, the *Scholarship of Multicultural Teaching and Learning*, and as a contributing author of *So You Want to Sing Spirituals* by Randye Jones, and a book *Singing Down the Barriers: A Guide to Centering African American Song for Concert Performers* with co-author Caroline Helton. He also served as a lecturer, vocal coach, and recital curator for the MN Duo Program in 2025.

Dr. Stephens grew up in Boston, holds a B.A. from Gordon College, an M.M. from Boston University, and a D.M.A. from the University of Michigan. He studied vocal techniques with Lisa Popeil and taught at universities in North Carolina, Michigan, and Arkansas. He is a member of the National Association of Teachers of Singing and the College Music Society.
